## **Historical Context:**





# Letter from Private Guy D. Brown, Potsdam, 1918

"I will send you a list of the boys killed, wounded and gassed. These are just what I know of from Sunday's list, but when I get back to the company, I will send you a list of them all.

There were three Collins brothers in my company. Sunday morning when we went over the top Pete was killed. Sunday night, when the battle was still on, "Spike" and Joe, his brothers, went out over the top and hunted around. They found his body and buried it. We went over the top at 6:10 a.m. and I was wounded in the right arm and elbow, but not seriously. I am in the hospital now.

#### TO AMERICA'S PATRIOTS:

Your name is on the Honor Roll of American history. Your patriotism in becoming an early subscriber to the first Liberty Loan is appreciated by the people of your state and of your country. You have served well.

Patriotism has its penalties as well as its rewards. The penalty is a constant effort on the part of real patriots who, by their clear-sightedness, their judgment superior to that of their fellows and the American energy which never fails in the hour of need, are spurred on to serve and serve again.

As we start on our second great Government Loan, the men who are serving in its details of distribution in Washington and in the financial centers of the country count on you to serve with them again. This time it is your effort as well as your money which is needed.

This letter is to request you to secure five new subscribers to the second Liberty Loan, persuading each one to subscribe as large an amount as he is able to, payable, if more convenient, in installments over a period of time. That you will make this effort, we are confident; that you will make it soon and continue it without cessation, until you have secured five subscribers, we carnestly

The war needs of the country are enormous for our first year of war. Funds must be raised through the sale of Government bonds or through taxation, and we know that you and your friends would rather help the Government raise its money through the purchase of bonds, which give you savings and income, than through taxation, which gives you nothing but protection.

Everyone must be urged to subscribe, and that they may pay for their bonds out of future savings, it has been arranged with many of the banks so that their subscribers can pay for their bonds by small weekly or monthly payments, made from increased savings. Everyone in the nation must and will practice a new thrift, a new and very rigid economy, in order to preserve and increase prosperity and win the war.

We will not trouble you to reply to this Committee, but are enclosing five application blanks which we trust you will have filled in by five of your friends who did not subscribe to the last Loan. After they have filled in and signed them, take them to the same bank which you patronized during the last Loan, or to any other bank in your community, and the bank will arrange so that the subscriptions of your friends will be properly taken care of.

In case you need any data or details as to the Partial Payment Plan, you may readily obtain same by calling on your bank or your Local Liberty Loan Committee.

ROY GRAVES, FRANK BARCLAY AND LEON LA FAY ARE DEAD.

George Goodhart Writes Word of Graves' Death, Official Telegram Coming Sunday, News of Barclay's Death Reached Here Thursday.

News has been received the past week of the death of three Potsdam men with the American Expeditionary Forces in France. Roy Graves, Company D, 17<sup>th</sup> Regt, was killed in action, October 12. Frank Barclay 23<sup>rd</sup> Engineers, died of burns Nov 3<sup>rd</sup>. Leon LaFay, Company D, 107 Regt. died Nov. 9<sup>th</sup>. LaFay had been in a hospital, wounded, for some time.

# TECH STUDENT MAKES DENIAL

NOT GERMAN SYMPATHIZER SAYS MAX HOYER.

Says Government Didn't Ask Him About Wireless.

On Monday morning the Republican Journal printed a story under a Canton date line stating that "Max Hoyer, who resides on Crescent St., this village, and who erected an aerial in connection with his wireless telegraphy station some time ago, has been compelled to destroy his aerial because of an order issued by the government. It is said that Hoy er, who is of German descent, favors Germany's war policies and has been outspoken in his views regarding his mother country's attitude toward the United States. This is believed to have been the reason why the gov ernment ordered him to remove his aerial."

Information reaching this paper last evening from Potsdam, where Mr. Hoyer has been a student in the Clarkson College since last Septem-ber, squarely contradicted the above, and the request was made that Mr. Hoyer's side of the matter be set forth. The young man is of German descent but is stated to be thoroughly Americanized; that instead of being nutspoked in his sympathies for the Fatherland he has pursued a strictly neutral course in word and deed. Categorical denial of the state ments was made in the following order: Mr. Hoyer's aerial outfit was dismantled last September and the wireless equipment has been disconnected since that time; he has receiv ed no notice from the government to destroy the apparatus and has not been outspoken in his views regarding the war issues.

The Republican-Journal's informant, who is officially connected with the Clarkson Colleges states that the young man has been greatly upset by the rumor and desires to be set right before the public."
